Time – the one thing in life in short supply and high demand. It has become the central focus of many, and at times, a source of frustration, disappointment, and anger. In reality, time (or the lack of) is the least consequential component of our day – or it should be.

Watches, clocks, cell phones, computers – and if you live in Charlotte – the weekly (Saturday at 1:00pm) testing of our tornado/storm sirens keep us on track. There are work hours – start and end; alarms to wake up to; favorite television shows; youth sports events and tournaments; breakfast-lunch-dinner; the start church; meetings deadlines: and appointments; more appointments; the end of church; and so on and so on – all designed to fill our days with beginnings and endings, scattered about to add more chaos and more



stress. The list is endless, but our time is not. And herein lies the problem. So what's the answer?

Recently during a conversation with a good friend of 50+ years, he jokingly said - "but don't pastors and other religious leaders have all the answers?" I assured him I did not – and neither does anyone else that I know. But I was wrong – not about me but about someone I know. And I'm sure you can guess who the "someone" is!

Thinking about the constraints on my time, and the overwhelming entries on my calendar, I find myself being drawn back to the following verse from Romans 12. Paul writes,

"Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God – what is good and acceptable and perfect."

I realize this is a struggle, for me and for you. The world and society in which we live does everything it can to throw hurdle after hurdle into the mainstream of life. The struggle is not in what is good and acceptable – we got this part. It's the 'perfect' – and the question, what is perfect.

Here's what I have on this – at this time and on this day. Perfect is making the conscious effort to set aside some time for ourselves – and <u>only ourselves</u>. Perfect is being in God's presence if only for 5 minutes a day. Perfect is committing to taking that 5 minutes now, and growing it with each passing day, week, month. I certainly do not have all the answers; neither do any of us. But God does!

Let me close with this... continue to pray as we do now. Take some more time every day just to be in his presence – just to feel the awe and wonder that is God as we sit alone in his creation – just to walk with Christ Jesus, even if it's just to the grocery store – just to listen to the comfort and peace the Holy Spirit gives all of us. Take a good look at the picture below – put yourself in that field and take some time just to be. Let us just take the time!


The Ladies of Peace had a wonderful time showering Baby Isaac! Here are some pictures from our lovely day!

Did you know... from The Lutheran Handbook....

LUTHER'S SEAL

Martin Luther wrote this letter from Colburg Castle on July 8th, 1530 describing his seal, aka Luther's Rose.

"Since you wish to know whether my seal is well done, I shall gladly comply with your request by communicating to you the thoughts I originally desired my seal to embrace as indicative of my theology.

First there is a cross, black on a heart in red, as its natural color. This is to remind me that faith in the Crucified saves us: for if one believes with the heart, one is justified. Now although it is a black cross, although it mortifies and is designed to inflict pain, it nonetheless allows the heart to keep its color, it does not destroy its nature, that is, it does not kill but keeps alive. (For the just lives by faith, but faith in the Crucified.)



Such a heart is to be centered on a white rose in order to indicate that faith yields joy, comfort, and peace and straightway beds one on a white, pleasing rose. Nor does faith yield the peace and joy of the world. Therefore the rose would be white and not red, because white is the color of the spirits and of all the angels.

This rose is on a field tinted with the hues of heaven to indicate that this joy in the spirit and faith is a beginning of the future heavenly joy, a joy which, to be sure, is even now present in faith and embraced by hope but is not yet revealed.

And around this field runs a ring of gold to show that the blessedness of heaven endures forever and ever and is more precious than all pleasures and possessions of earth, as gold is the most precious and the noblest metal."

Luther's Small Catechism

(the beginning of a refresher course)

Many have asked about reviewing Luther's Small Catechism – especially the information covered in our confirmation classes. Beginning this month, we will cover in our newsletter everything our confirmation students are required to know and understand in and from Luther's catechism.

This month, we begin with the Ten Commandments. They are listed, along with Martin Luther's explanation of each – taken directly from the Small Catechism.

The Ten Commandments

The 1st Commandment: You shall have no other gods.

What is this? We are to fear, love, and trust God above all things.

• Bible Reading: Exodus 32

The 2nd Commandment: You shall not make wrongful use of the name of the

Lord your God.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not curse,

swear, practice magic, lie, or deceive using God's name, but instead use that very name in every time of need to

call on, pray to, praise, and give thanks to God.

• Bible Reading: Leviticus 24:10-16

The 3rd Commandment: Remember the sabbath day and keep it holy.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not despise

God's Word or preaching, but instead keep that Word

holy and gladly hear and learn it.

• Bible reading: Luke 10:38-42

The 4th Commandment: Honor your father and mother.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we neither despise

nor anger our parents and others in authority, but instead

honor, serve, obey, love, and respect them.

• Bible reading: Luke 2:41-52

The 5th Commandment: You shall not murder.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we neither endanger

nor harm the lives of our neighbors, but instead help and

support them in all of life's needs.

• Bible reading: Genesis 4:1-16

The 6th Commandment: You shall not commit adultery.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we lead pure and

decent lives in word and deed, and each of us loves and

honors his or her spouse.

• Bible reading: 2 Samuel 11

The 7th Commandment: You shall not steal.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we neither take our

neighbors' money or property nor cheat them by using shoddy merchandise or crooked deals to obtain it for ourselves, but instead help them to improve and protect

their property and income.

• Bible reading: Joshua 7:1

The 8th Commandment: You shall not bear false witness against your neighbor. What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies

We are to fear and love God, so that we do not tell lies about our neighbors, betray, or slander them, or destroy

their reputations. Instead, we are to come to their defense, speak well of them, and interpret everything

they do in the best possible light.

• Bible reading: Luke 22:54-62

The 9th Commandment: You shall not covet your neighbor's house.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not try to trick

our neighbors out of their inheritance or property or try to get it for ourselves by claiming to have a legal right to it and the like, but instead be of help and service to them in

keeping what is theirs.

The 10th Commandment: You shall not covet your neighbor's wife, or male or

female slave, or ox, or donkey, or anything that belongs

to your neighbor.

What is this? We are to fear and love God, so that we do not entice,

force, or steal away from our neighbors their spouses, workers, or livestock, but instead urge them to stay and

remain loyal to our neighbors.

What does God say about all of these commandments?

God says the following: "I the Lord your God am a jealous God, punishing children for the iniquity of parents, to the third and the fourth generation of those who reject me, but showing steadfast love to the

thousandth generation of those who love me and keep my

commandments."

What is this? God threatens to punish all who break the

commandments. Therefore we are to fear his wrath and not disobey the commandments. However, God promises grace and every good thing to all those who keep these commandments. Therefore we are to love and trust him

and gladly act according to his commands.
